<input type="checkbox"/> Generalized Tonic Clonic: A convulsion. Falling to the ground with bodily stiffness followed by massive jerking movements.	<input type="checkbox"/> Absence: A blank stare, lasting only a few seconds, often frequent. Can be mistaken for daydreaming or inattention.	<input type="checkbox"/> Sensory: Usually doesn't result in loss of consciousness. May cause uncontrolled shaking of arm, leg or other part of body; altered emotions; change in the way things look, smell, feel, taste or sound; sleep disturbance.	<input type="checkbox"/> Complex: Altered consciousness and usually causes memory loss. Starts with blank stare followed by repeated movements that seem out of place and mechanical. Child unaware of surroundings and may seem dazed. Can be mistaken for behavior problem.

Basic seizure first aid <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Stay calm and track time • Keep child safe • Do not restrain • Do not put anything in mouth • Stay with child until fully conscious • Document seizure • Protect head • Turn child on side • Keep airway open/watch breathing 	A seizure is considered an emergency when <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Convulsive (tonic-clonic) seizure lasts longer than 5 min. • Student has repeated seizures without regaining consciousness • Student sustains significant injury • Student has a first-time seizure • Student has difficulty breathing after seizure subsides • Student has a seizure in water
